<u>'Ventura Highway' - Performance Notes (1)</u>

Several guitars are used on the original recording of '*Ventura Highway*', including six and twelve-string acoustics. This lesson is designed for performances by one or two guitarists. The following sections will focus on the essential lead and rhythm guitar parts played throughout the Intro and Verse sections.

Rhythm Guitar

The two-chord 'G6/D-Dmaj7' progression is the primary rhythm guitar part that is repeated throughout the Intro, Verse, and Chorus sections. Guitarist Dewey Bunnell uses the thumb to mute the bottom string for both chord shapes.

<u>Strum Pattern</u>

The key to the rhythm is to set a percussive 'choppy' feel with the right strumming hand. Initially, skip the muting ('x') in between chords and focus solely on the bass note/chord rhythm ('bass-chop... chop-chop'). The very last 'chop' is occasionally muted on the recording. Keep time by emphasizing the bass note for each chord. The arrows below the tab represent up and down strokes.

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<u>Lead Guitar - 1</u>

On the original recording, two guitars play a repeated riff with slight variations throughout the Intro and Verse sections. The more-dominant sounding guitar part is shown in the tab, and can be played on either a twelve or six-string acoustic. Just prior to the Chorus (0:43) a doublestop riff is shown that works well for performances with just one lead guitarist. Aside from the opening riff, the entire sequence of riffs is repeated during the second half of the song. All riffs are based from the 'D' Major scale.

<u>'Ventura Highway' - Performance Notes (2)</u>

<u>Chorus</u> (0:47)

The entire band 'kicks-in' *(three guitars, bass, drums)*, providing a backing rhythm that cannot be replicated by just one or two guitars. With other guitars, the 'choppy' acoustic rhythm played throughout the Intro and Verse can continue throughout the Chorus, otherwise a more 'sustained' strumming rhythm may be required to fill in the gaps.

The final 'Dmaj7' section features a repeated staccato-like 'Dmaj7-Em7' chord change where the first finger simply lifts off the 'Dmaj7' chord to play 'Em7' during the '*know-ou-wo*....' section.

The Chorus ends with a unique 'F #m11' chord, which provides a dramatic 'lead-in' prior to the Bridge with a steady downstroke rhythm. Note the emphasis on strumming the higher strings on various beats.

<u>Arrangement</u>



Chorus - Guitar 3

On the original recording, three acoustic guitars are played together for the Chorus. Two guitars follow the 'G/D-Dmaj7' progression, while an arpeggiated melody is played on the third guitar track shown below. For both chords, simply slide an open 'D' chord shape (with the middle finger lifted off the top string) up and down one fret. Count each measure as: (1-2-3)(1-2-3-4)(1-2)



Bridge (1:09)

Note the change in rhythm at the end of the Bridge, using all downstrokes to 'rev-up' or lead-in to the Alternate Verse section.

Alt Verse (1:29)

The Alternate Verse section essentially reverses the Chorus progression to 'Dmaj7-G/D'.
