

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'Brown-Eyed Girl' - Performance Notes

This lesson for '*Brown-Eyed Girl*' is designed for beginners and for singers who wish to accompany themselves with a basic 'strum-along' arrangement while singing. On the original recording, various riffs are played on electric guitar while the chords are played on a steel-string acoustic. The strum pattern used here allows for a slower, less-challenging version to play that remains steady and consistent throughout the song. The following sections provide a step by step approach.

<u>The Strum Pattern</u>

The first step is to learn the *strum pattern* as it remains the same for each chord played throughout the song. The strum pattern can be described either using strokes ('*down - down-up-up-down'*), or a count ('*one - one-two-three-four'*). Starting with just a 'G' chord, repeat the strum pattern a few times before moving on to the chord changes.

Adding Vocals

To combine vocals with strumming, try to slowly 'sync-up' specific lyrics with chord changes. For this step, it isn't necessary to sing at proper pitch, but to instead simply 'talk' through the lyrics and to 'land' each chord change to its corresponding lyric. This can be done at any pace as the objective isn't speed but in establishing proper timing between vocals and chords.

Arranging Sections

<u>Verses</u> - Each verse is essentially a 'G-C-G-D' progression played four times, with a 'D7' being *substituted* for 'D' in the last sequence prior to the <u>Chorus</u>.

<u>Chorus</u> - The <u>Chorus</u> is an eight-chord progression that immediately follows each verse. The <u>Chorus</u> always begins on the 'you' vocal and ends with a 'D7' chord that 'leads-in' to either a verse or a bridge section.

<u>**Bridge</u>** - The <u>Bridge</u> section begins with three consecutive 'D7' chords, then essentially repeats the <u>Verse</u> chords during the 'Sha la la...' section.</u>

Bass Solo - For a strum-along version, this section can simply be strummed with the chords shown (*no vocals*), or just skipped over to begin <u>Verse 3</u>.

<u>Ending</u> - On the original recording, the song ends with a *fade-out*. For live performance, a suggested 'G-D7-G' progression can be used as an ending.

<u>Intro</u>

On the original recording, the Intro features a classic guitar riff played on electric guitar. For an unaccompanied strum-along version, a 'G-C-G-D' progression can be played twice as an Intro without vocals, or the song can simply begin with Verse 1.
